AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE PUBLIC SAFETY BY REGULATING THE BURIAL OF DEAD BODIES BY PROHIBITING THE BURIAL OF DEAD BODIES IN A PUBLIC GRAVEYARD, was read in full and passed second reading by following vote:- Yea The Mayor, Councilmen Watson and Sifly.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE PUBLIC SAFETY BY REGULATING THE MOVEMENT OF VEHICLES OF EVERY KIND ON THE STREETS OF THE CITY OF ORANGEBURGS.C. BY ADDING A SECTION TO BE KNOWN AS SECTION 50 A, TO PREVENT INDISCRIMINATE USE OF THE SIDEWALKS BY VEHICLES AND ANIMALS, was read amended and passed second reading by following vote,

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE LICENSES IN THE CITY OF ORANGEBURG FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING APRIL 1, 1922 AND ENDING MARCH 31, 1923 received and passed first reading by following vote:-

Yea The Mayor, Councilmen Watson and Sifly.

Councilman Sifly reported to Council that during past month two of City Mules had died and that he with Councilman Watson had purchased two mule and traded for another and recommended that City sell at auction on salesday of next February being Monday 6th of that month two ~~old~~ mules that had been in service for some years. Action as reported by Councilman Sifly and recommendation as to sale of mules was approved by following vote:

Yea The Mayor, Councilmen Watson and Sifly.

Councilman Sifly also reported that he had asked for bids for building one new trash wagon and rebuilding one old wagon city to furnish wheels and axles and had awarded the work to Owen & Co their bid being the lowest for \$100.00. Approved by following vote ; Yea The Mayor, Councilmen Watson and Sifly.

The payment of \$150.00 on account of Automobile for Chief of Fire Department, the Chief agreeing to settle balance of cost was upon motion ordered.

Vote Yea The Mayor, Councilmen Watson and Sifly

Upon recommendation of Councilman Sifly City Improvement Commission was requested to curb grade and widen Columbia Road from North Broughton Street to Green Street, petitions having been signed by requisite abutting property owners, Vote

Yea The Mayor, Councilmen Watson and Sifly.

REGULAR MEETING JAN. 27, 1922 continued.

The Matter of boring another well at Power plant to increase water supply was discussed and matter was referred to Councilman Watson with power to act.

At a joint meeting of City Council and City Improvement Commission held Jan. 20, 1922 The County Highway Commission through its Chairman J. W. Smoak submitted a proposition to remove present steel bridge across Edisto River foot of West Russel Street, replacing same with a modern concrete bridge to be constructed further down stream; The City of Orangeburg to pay one-fourth of cost of construction of said bridge and straighten out west Russel Street to connect with bridge, thereby eliminating a dangerous curve now existing. Work on Bridge to be under supervision of Orangeburg Highway Commission.

This proposition received the unanimous endorsement of joint meeting and City Council was requested to take necessary action.

Following resolution was passed.

RESOLVED, That proposition submitted by Mr. J. W. Smoak relative to removal of present bridge across Edisto River and replacing same with a modern concrete bridge as submitted by Mr. Smoak of Orangeburg Highway Commission at joint meeting of City Council with City Improvement Commission Jan. 20th is hereby approved and that City Improvement Commission be requested to co-operate with County highway Commission in carrying out same, and expense be paid from Street Improvement funds, provided, that plans and specifications of bridge be submitted to City Council and City Improvement Commission before acceptance of same.

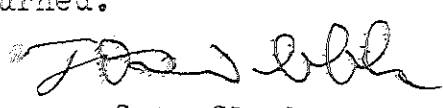
Engineer Hawes stated that a party living without the City Limits desired to connect with City Sewer System and requested instructions relative to same.

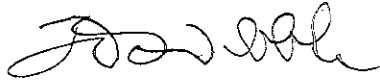

Council consented to this request and appointed Chief of Fire Department and Engineer Hawes to represent City and Mr. Finkelstein to appoint an architect to represent himself.

City Clerk was instructed to furnish Mr. Finkelstein with a copy of Chiefs report and advise him that the Opera House must be made safe for public use at once.

Petition from Mr. M. A. Shecut for electric connection at his store W. Russel Street near river, and from residents and property owners on oak street for extension of water mains on said street referred to Councilman Watson with power to act.

Agreement submitted by Southern Railway relative to water Main crossing their right of way and under track on Sellers Ave was read and sa Council was unwilling to sign agreement as submitted same was referred to City Attorney for revision.

To the City Council of
the City of Orangeburg:

In accordance with my duties as Chief of the Fire Department and on account of certain reports reaching me I have completed an investigation of the Academy of Music and am compelled to report that it is in a dangerous condition. The building is old, and shows indications of serious decay, so that in the event of it being crowded there is ~~is~~ imminent danger of collapse in case of sudden commotion or panic. The defective wiring, and improper heating arrangements, are liable to cause fire at any time. For these reasons I recommend immediate repairs, and that prompt measures be taken to avoid this excessive fire risk. A fire escape on the northern side of the building is essential if those who gather there are to have adequate protection from fire hazard. I have not gone into detail as to the defects which cause me to make these recommendations, but would be glad to point them out.

After comparison of bids that of Hughes Well Specialty Co. was deemed the most advisable and following resolution offered by Councilman Watson was adopted by following vote:-

At request of Health Commissioner and with the approval of Board of Health, Council was requested to pass amendment to health Department rules and regulations the following:-

Rule 117b. No person shall sell or offer for sale, store for sale or deliver after sale or transport over the streets, roads, by-ways, alleys or other public places of the City for the purpose of sale, offering for sale, or delivery, after sale, any milk in any container labelled or branded so as to deceive the customer as to the contents of said container, or where said statement, design, device, label or brand shall be false or misleading in any particular.

This rule was passed and ordered attached to rules of Health Department by following vote:-

Yea The Mayor, Councilmen Watson, and Sifly.

Agreement submitted by Southern Ry relative to crossing of Their right of way with water pipe line on Sellers Ave to connect with S.R.R. Ave was read and referred to City Atty. for revision and notice to Railway that Council would not pass same as submitted.

Councilman Sifly was requested to accompany some representative of Sunnyside Cemetary and Colored Peoples Cemetary for the purpose of setting aside a small plot in each for burial of bodies where same is required of City.

Members of City Improvement Commission present at meeting expressed their full approval to above action of Council.

The Mayor stated to City Council that a Committee from Chamber of Commerce had a conference with Senator Hutson and member of Legislature relative to retaining Veneraal Clinic in City it having been rumored that on account of lack of funds clinic was to be discontinued and County delegation desired to know what city

RE-INSPECTION OF MOVING PICTURE THEATRE.

Re-Inspected December 19, 1920.

ACADEMY OF MUSIC (a)—Block 54, Sheet 8.

57 East Side of South Middleton Street.

Upon re-inspection the following defects were noted in the wiring and equipment:

Wires of opposite polarity in contact or too close together; wires not supported at sufficiently frequent intervals; wires not rigidly supported or loose from supports; flexible tubing used through floors or in damp places; flexible cords attached to circuit wires and not properly supported; lamp sockets broken or not bushed; joints not soldered and taped or improperly made and taped; flexible cords in bad shape or hung on metal hooks or nails or run through partitions or used as circuit wire; too many lights or more than 660 watts on one circuit; wiring not installed in metal conduit; border lights wired open and not properly protected from mechanical injury; wires too small for current carried; border lights connected through solid conductors; fuse blocks not in cabinets; wires not properly protected where liable to mechanical injury; lamps in dressing rooms not provided with approved lamp guards.

Remarks.

This inspection was made in company with Mr. L. E. Knight, stage manager, and Mr. Harry O'Cain, an employee of the city, to whom the defects noted were pointed out. Correction was not promised. The wiring and equipment as a whole was found to be in very poor condition and it is urged that this theatre be given attention at once. Copy of this Report

should be mailed to Mr. J. B. Seiginous, manager of the theatre, and Mr. J. F. Pearson, superintendent of the electric light plant.

Gentlemen;

Subject, Condition of Opera House.

The Opera House located corner of Middleton Street and Wiles Street owned by Mr. K. Finglestein, as requested by you we have this day made a thorough examination of the said opera house and recommend the following repairs and alterations be made at once,

(1) The floors of dressing rooms under the stage is in a very shakey and unsafe condition, Two of the 8" X 8" posts that support the floor of stage are in a dry rot state, also a portion of a main sill is rotted, These should be replaced at once.

(2) The Easterly brick wall of building (rear of stage) has a number of holes partly through wall, these should be filled with brick work to strengthen the wall.

(3) One 4" Steel column supporting balcony we found in a loose and unsafe condition, and have removed same ourselves, this should be replaced

(4) Electric Wiring, The switchboard on stage we find to be open and exposed and in a dangerous condition, there are numerous wires laying loose and twisted together laying on exposed wood in the loft of the building, ~~XXXXXX~~ several porcelain tubes are missing where wires go through partitions, The wiring in its present condition is highly inflammable, In fact all of the electrical wiring in this building is in bad condition, and we recommend that it should be rewired, we further refer you to report of South Eastern Underwrighters association which is herewith attached.

(5) The Heating apparatus which consists of FOUR (4) stoves have smoak pipes running through wood partitions, very little protected with sheet iron, One main smoak pipe is running across building and within six inches of floor joists, the heat from this pipe has drawn the tar from the timbers, this wood work is unsifficiently protected with metal or asbestos.

The heating apparatus in this building should be condemed, and rebuilt at once.

(6) Fire Escapes.

The Fire escape on South side of building is badly in need of repair, the flooring being rotted, making it unsafe in its present condition.

A Fire escape should be installed on the Wiles street side of the building,

At all fire escapes there should be on outside of building an electric light kept burning during night performances.

AN ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE THE
ISSUANCE OF \$250,000 STREET
IMPROVEMENT BONDS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF
ORANGEBURG, SOUTH CAROLINA IN REGULAR COUNCIL ASSEMBLED.

Section 1. That the negotiable coupon bonds of the
City of Orangeburg shall be issued in the sum of \$250,000,
the said bonds having been authorized by vote of the elec-
tors taken November 4, 1919, in the sum of \$610,000, of
which bonds so voted \$100,000 were issued under date of
January 1, 1920 and \$160,000 were issued under date of
April 1, 1921.

Section 2. That the bonds authorized by this ordi-
nance shall consist of 250 bonds of \$1,000 each, numbered
1 to 250 inclusive, dated March 1, 1922, maturing March 1,
1962, with the right of prior redemption on March 1, 1942,
or on any interest payment date thereafter before maturity,
bearing interest at a rate not exceeding 5-¹/₂% per centum
per annum, to be hereafter determined by resolution, payable
semi-annually on the first days of March and September of
each year, both principal and interest to be payable at
such bank in New York as may be determined by resolution.

Section 3. That the proceeds of said bonds shall be
used only for paying for permanent street improvements with-
in the City of Orangeburg, in accordance with said election
held November 4, 1919.

Section 4. Said bonds shall be signed by the Mayor
and countersigned by the Clerk and Treasurer, under the
corporate seal of the city, and the interest coupons there-
to attached shall be signed with the facsimile signatures of
said two officers, and the form of said bonds and coupons
shall be substantially as follows:

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS that the City of Orangeburg in Orangeburg County, South Carolina, is justly indebted and for value received hereby promises to pay to the bearer on the first day of March, 1962, the principal sum of

ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS

with interest thereon at the rate of _____ per centum per annum, payable semi-annually on the first days of March and September of each year upon the presentation and surrender of the annexed interest coupons as they severally become due. Both principal and interest of this bond are payable at _____ in the City of New York.

For the prompt payment hereof both principal and interest as the same become due, the full faith, credit and resources of said city are hereby irrevocably pledged.

The City of Orangeburg reserves the right to redeem and pay this bond on March 1, 1942, or on any interest payment date thereafter prior to maturity, provided thirty days' notice of such intended redemption shall have been filed at the said place of payment.

This bond is one of 250 bonds of \$1,000 each, aggregating \$250,000, and is issued to pay for permanent street improvements within the City of Orangeburg under the authority of and in full compliance with the Constitution and laws of South Carolina, and in particular Section 3050 et sequitur Compiled Laws, 1912, and pursuant to a vote of a majority of the qualified electors of said city at an election duly called and held upon petition of a majority of the freeholders of said city as shown by its tax books, and an

ordinance duly adopted by the City Council. 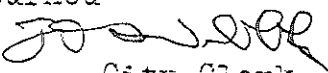

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into this 16th day of March, 1922, by and between the Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of New York and hereinafter styled the Telephone Company, party of the first part, and the City of Orangeburg, S. C., a municipal corporation hereinafter styled the City, party of the second part.

WITNESSETH, whereas the Telephone Company heretofore, to wit, on or about the 29th day of October, 1921, brought a bill in the United States District Court for the Eastern District of South Carolina seeking to enjoin the enforcement of an ordinance and penalties therein inflicted which ordinance was ratified and approved by the City Council of the said City on or about the 12th day of August, 1921, and is entitled: "An Ordinance requiring the removal from certain streets in the City of Orangeburg of all telephone, telegraph, electric light poles, wires, cables and serial construction".

WHEREAS, said suit is now pending and the United States District Court has refused an interlocutory injunction and has temporarily and for a period of thirty days restrained the said City from enforcing the provisions of such ordinance provided the said Telephone Company appeals to the Circuit Court of Appeals and gives bond as provided in said order of the District Court in the sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00), and,

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the said Telephone Company and the said City to amicably adjust the matters in controversy and avoid the necessity of further proceedings in said litigation; the Telephone Company being desirous of more time than that allowed by said ordinance for the removal of its said poles and wires, and the City being willing to extend such time.

THIS AGREEMENT WITNESSETH, that said Telephone Company, in consideration of the agreement on the part of the said City hereinafter set forth, agrees to abandon its said pending suit and to remove its poles and wires on Broughton Street from Amelia to Calhoun Streets and remove its poles and wires on Russell Street from Windsor to Broughton Streets by November 1, 1922, and to remove its poles and wires on Broughton Street from Calhoun Street to the Atlantic Coast Line Railway track by November 1, 1923;

Communication from the American Spotless Street System stating that trash containers will be installed in a short time and expressing regret that they had not delivered same as per their contract, was received as information.

Application from Hamilton - Hill Veneer Company for extension of water service to their plant for fire protection was read and upon motion of Councilman Watson it was unanimously decided to extend water mains on Glover from corner of Riggs Street to Salley Street thence on Salley Street to valve corner Salley and Fletcher Street, designated on plat attached, the private fire protection mains and hydrants to be installed by City at expense of Hamilton-Hill Veneer Plant.

Dr. H. F. Schiffley was present at meeting and verbally submitted proposition relative to opening a City Venereal Clinic. His proposition was that the City appropriate \$1,600 per annum towards support of same; twelve hundred dollars to be deposited with State Treasurer at the same time the same will be matched with \$1,000 from U.S. Government Appropriation, with these funds Dr. Schiffley said that the Venereal Clinic could be conducted for City patients. This proposition as submitted was accepted and Dr. Schiffley was to place his suggestions in writing and file same with City Clerk by following vote:- Yea The Mayor, Councilmen Watson and Sifly.

Mr. H. L. Dillard in interest of Tar Creole to be used in campaign against flies was present and the matter of purchasing a barrel of same was referred to Board of Health.

Mr. Watson called to attention of City Council the lack of enforcement of the Ordinance requiring "dimmers" on Automobiles, and Chief of Police's warning to Auto drivers having been disregarded he was instructed to enforce this Ordinance.

REGULAR MEETING APRIL 28, 1922 continued.

Dr. I. C. Shecut and Mr. W. L. Glover were present and discussed with Council the advisability of securing the services of the contractors who for the past two or three years have been draining the lowlands in the vicinity of Bowman and whose contract is practically completed to open up a drainage canal for about two miles along the Edisto River to drain swamp and by this means assist in the fight against the mosquito and reduce the danger of malaria. No action was taken by Council.

Replying to your favor of October 30th, with which you enclosed resolution passed by the City Council of Orangeburg on that date with reference to the rebuilding and operation of a portion of the old Orangeburg Railroad track in the City of Orangeburg, in order to furnish railroad facilities to the City Power Plant-

Beg to advise that this proposition has been given very careful consideration, and it is understood:

First- That the City of Orangeburg is willing to provide at its expense suitable right-of-way, following as nearly as practicable the former right-of-way of the abandoned Orangeburg Railway, and construct thereon, satisfactory to our Maintenance of Way Department, a track from our right-of-way to the City Power Station, including spur track near the end of the line for switching purposes, and after completion property to be deeded to the Atlantic Coast Line for operation and maintenance thereafter.

Second- The City of Orangeburg will provide and thereafter maintain at its expense in condition satisfactory to the Atlantic Coast Line, a trestle for unloading of fuel for the City at its plant-

Third- It is understood that other industries may be served on the track to be built by the City of Orangeburg, except, of course, the trestle at the Municipal Plant provided for the use of the City-

Fourth- The Atlantic Coast Line is agreeable to selling the necessary 70-1B. rail and other material for the construction of the tracks by the City of Orangeburg, the prices to be fixed by our Purchasing Agent-

Fifth- Our Company will arrange to furnish the City a competent Foreman for the supervision of this construction, with the understanding that the City will pay the payrolls of the Foreman and labor employed -

Sixth- Based on the above understanding, the Railroad is willing to restore its old connection track, extending practically to our right-of-way line from intersection with the pass track.

Seventh- The Railroad Company will be willing to accept the track built by the City of Orangeburg after completion, and thereafter maintain and operate it, permitting the construction of additional tracks leading out therefrom to serve other industries, all of which will be subject to our standard form of contracts governing in such cases.

The above is not a formal agreement, but a memorandum for the purpose of putting something definite before the City Council in reply to its proposition submitted October 30th, the details to be worked out more minutely in regular manner between the City of Orangeburg and the Atlantic Coast Line-

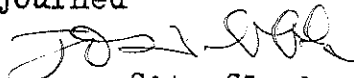
