Once during the past year then entire department was called out at the corner of North Middleton and West Amelia St. On December 6th, 1925 at this time there were seven buildings on fire at one time the fire losses on this fire being \$ 5,400.00

The American Lafrance truck made four trips out of town during the past year three of these being in the suburban districts and the other being to Badham S.C. The trip to Badham S.C. Requiring a round trip of 85 miles.

There were 330 electrical permits issued during the past year and on each job thorough inspection was made by the Chief. All of this work is done strictly in accordance with the specifications of the Southeastern Underwriters Association.

During the past year the department answered over twice as many calls as they did in 1925., there being \$ 304,263.00 worth of property more at risk this year than in 1925. The fire losses having also decreased by \$ 16,383.55. The insurances losses for the year

were decreased by \$ 9,532.25 and the uninsured losses decreased by \$ 6,850.00.

The discipline of the men at the fires as well as the station has been very good the men always attending fires promptly and always reporting to work on time.

Of the 131 fires this year we had 72 frame 9 brick and 1 metal buildings on fire.

Comments.

During the past year the traffic signals were put up at the intersections of Broughton and West Russell St. and Russell and Middleton Street. These traffic signals has been of a wonderful assistance to traffic on main streets and have practically eliminated traffic congestions on these corners which arose quite frequently before they were placed on these corners.

The parking system has been changed on Russell Street from the center of the street to the side this also eliminating lots of the trouble that arose from cars being parked wrong etc.

During the past year quite a number of raids have been made for stolen goods as well as whiskey violators. In these cases a number of seizures were made and the violators prosecuted.

The discipline of the police during the past year has been very good the police always being prompt to report to work and very few of them were forced to report off during the year on account of sickness.

I take this opportunity of thanking the Honorable mayor as well as the Councilmen for the valuable assistance that they have rendered me during the past year as the efficiency of the men has been helped wonderfully by the service they have received from them.

In conclusion I have only one request that I would like to have the Mayor and Councilmen consider at this time and that is that an additional post or beat be made to cover the A.C.L. Depot. at this time I have a man stationed at the Southern Depot all of the time and I feel that there should be one stationed at the Atlantic Coast Line all of the time as there are a number of warehouses in this territory as well as residences. The way that this post is worked now is for the man doing duty on Russell Street is to leave this beat and go to the Depot whenever a train arrives. I have had a number of requests from parties living in this district asking that they be given police protection in this territory. Thanking you to give this matter your due consideration.

I wish to call your attention to the increase in collections in Sanitary Dues and Compound Taxes over the periods of 1924 and 1925. The increase in Compound tax collections in the office over 1924 in 1926 was \$ 319.00, and in 1926 over 1925 was \$ 192.00. My increase in collections over the previous collector in 1926 over 1924 was \$ 1,457.00, in 1926 ~~over~~ the collections were increased over 1925 by the collector \$ 2,144.00.

Part of this oncrease of the collector was for the year 1925, but after deducting this amount there still leaves a considerable increase. I still have to be collected several hundred dollars to be credited to the account of 1926 Compound taxes.

The Sanitary dues collected in 1926 increased over 1924 collections by \$ 1,070.50 and increased over 1925 by \$ 1,284.50 .This amount will still be increased as I have turned over to the City Clerk & Treasurer practically \$ 100.00 during January 1927 and I still have several hundred dollars yet to collect.

During the past year I have made practically 700 license inspections some of these I having been compelled to call on several times. I have rounded up about eight or ten painters that have never paid a license before but paid this year. I have also found a number of contractors that were doing business without licenses, as well as a number of others that had opened up new businesses without first getting a license.

As far as I know I have a complete record of all of the toilets in the City limits and have compelled all of them to pay sanitary dues. In my trips around town I have noticed some toilets that were practically unusable and I have reported these cases to the Board of Health and they have all been fixed.

I also feel that I have about a complete a list of citizens eligible for Compound tax as can be gotten at this time.

I have found it a very hard proposition keeping behind the negroes for sanitary dues as they move so fast but I feel that I have not lost many of them excepting those that have moved in the Country.

APPLICATION FOR ELECTRIC SERVICE.

The Broad River Power Company (hereinafter called "Company") is hereby requested to connect its mains with the equipment installed on the premises of the power plant of the City of Orangeburg, S. C., (hereinafter called "Consumer") located at Orangeburg, S. C., and to furnish Consumer with electric service for said equipment.

This service shall be 2300 volts, three phase, sixty cycles, for a capacity of all or part of Consumer's requirements in motors and lighting. In consideration of such connection being made, the Consumer agrees to take from the Company all or part of electric service required by the Consumer, other than that generated by the Consumer's present power plant, for the full term of this agreement and to pay for this service monthly, or as billed, under rates as set forth in Schedule #1, hereto attached, and as measured by the Company meter.

The Consumer agrees to pay the rates and observe the regulations of the Company, as filed with the Railroad Commission of the State of South Carolina, or any revisions of same that may be allowed by the Railroad Commission from time to time.

The terms of this agreement shall extend from February 24th, 1927 (or as soon thereafter as the Company is able to deliver and the Consumer to receive electric power), until terminated on a fixed date after February 24, 1930, by either party giving one month's written notice specifying the date of termination.

The electric power to be supplied hereunder is designated as Primary Power. Said electric power shall be delivered by Company to Consumer at a terminal or delivery point at the plant of Consumer, located at the present power plant of the City of Orangeburg, S. C.

All meters used for measuring said electric power hereunder shall be located at the plant of Consumer, and to be located on the 2300 volt side of the transformers; voltage to be maintained between limits of five (5%) per cent above and five (5%) per cent below 2300 volts.

In making this application, it is understood that it shall not be binding upon the Company until accepted by it through its proper executive officer, and that it shall not be modified or affected by any promise, agreement or representation by any agent or employee of the Company, made before or after signing, unless incorporated in writing into this agreement before acceptance by the Company.

This agreement shall bind and inure to the benefit of the successors and assigns of the respective parties hereto, but neither the Consumer nor its assigns shall assign any rights hereunder without the written consent of the Company.







That the said City agrees to connect its service wires with consumer's wires at _____ Street, used as _____, and there install a meter in a meter loop, which has been provided by the Consumer, and furnish electric current to the Consumer, under electric current rate schedule _____, for a connected load of _____ Kilo-Watts and the Consumer agrees to use electric current furnished by the City Plant for the purpose permitted under said schedule, and to pay for the same at the schedule rates.

2. That the said City agrees to furnish metered water through a _____ inch pipe line, connecting the Consumer's pipes at _____ Street to the water mains on _____ Street, and the Consumer agrees to use water furnished by the plant of the said City.

The Consumer agrees that the use of Electric Current and Water shall be subject to the rules, rates and regulations of the ORANGEBURG WATER and LIGHT PLANT, as adopted by resolution or ordinance of the City Council, and to pay for service of electric current and water at the office of the ORANGEBURG WATER and LIGHT PLANT, monthly, as specified in the above mentioned rules, rates and regulations, which are hereto attached and made a part of this contract.

This contract shall be effective until October 1st, after date, and shall be automatically renewed yearly unless notice to the contrary is given thirty days prior to its expiration by either party to this agreement.

This contract shall not be binding unless approved by the Superintendent, or acting Superintendent of the ORANGEBURG WATER and LIGHT PLANT.

RULES, RATES AND REGULATIONS

—OF—

Orangeburg Water and Light Plant of the City of Orangeburg

Adopted by Resolution, April 22, 1927.

(1) Bills for water and electric service will be issued monthly, and while the City will make every reasonable effort to see that each patron of the plant receives his bill, no responsibility will be assumed for non delivery when same has been mailed at the Post Office.

(2) All charges for water and electric current service (1) are due and payable at the office of the Orangeburg Water and Light Plant, during office hours, on the SIXTEENTH day of each month and EXCEPT WHERE SPECIFICALLY STATED TO THE CONTRARY in these regulations and rates. All bills for WATER and ELECTRIC CURRENT paid on or before the FIFTEENTH day of the month in which the bill is dated will be subject to a discount of 10 per cent, except bills for electric current furnished under schedule No. 3. Bills will be dated on the first day of the month and will cover service for one month prior to date of bill.

(3) All services will be metered. Where meters fail to register, bills shall be arrived at by taking an average of the three most recent months.

(4) The consumer making payment by mail is entitled to discount only when Post Office canceled stamp evidences mailing on or before the FIFTEENTH day of the month in which payment is due.

(5) All bills that have not been paid on the last day of the month in which bill is dated, will have added a FIFTY CENT collection charge and will be turned over to a collector who will present the bill at the place where water and electric service is being furnished for payment. If this bill together with the collection charge is not paid service will be discontinued.

(6) When service has been discontinued for non payment as in paragraph (5) charges for all service to date become due immediately and service will not be re-installed until all bills due, together with collection charges, and cut in charge of FIFTY CENTS per service has been paid and a forfeit deposit, similar in amount to the amount paid in settlement, made with the City.

(7) A forfeit deposit equal to two months probable service will be required from all users of Water and Electric Current in the City of Orangeburg, S. C.

(8) No claim or demand that the consumer may have against the City shall be considered as an offset against the payment for service furnished under these regulations.

(9) The City agrees to use reasonable diligence in providing a regular and uninterrupted supply of water and current, but in case the supply of water or current should be interrupted or fail by accident, or any other cause whatsoever, the City shall not be liable for such interruption or failure.

(10) No additional service will be installed until a contract, clearly stating rates, discounts, charges, etc., has been entered into.

(11) No contract shall be binding upon the City unless it has been accepted in writing by the Mayor or acting Mayor of the City of Orangeburg.

(12) These Rules, Regulations and Rates are referred to in, and made a part of, each contract for water and electric service.

WATER

All water meters will be installed on the streets, which is the property of the City of Orangeburg, S. C.

No flat service will be furnished, EXCEPT to such carnivals and traveling shows as it would be inadvisable to meter, and then a special rate will be proposed.

The minimum charge will be made on the basis of one month, and while this charge will be made for any part of a month down to one-third, if a service is cut in after the 20th of any month and a contract entered into at the same time, no bill will be rendered for that part of the month and until the first of the month following.

The following rate is based on the usage for one month and the charge is per 100 cubic feet (1 cubic foot is equal to 7½ gallons.)

.25c per 100 Cu. Ft. for the first 5,000 Cu. Ft. a month.
 .20c per 100 Cu. Ft. for the next 10,000 Cu. Ft. a month.
 .17½c per 100 Cu. Ft. for all in excess of 15,000 Cu. Ft. a month.

PROVIDED that the bill in no case be less than the following schedule of minimum rates which are based on the size of pipe supplying the service. Provided, also, that where one tap and service pipe supplies more than one building the minimum rate will be obtained by multiplying the minimum rate shown in the schedule for the size of the pipe used by the number of buildings supplied, EXCEPT that in case of factories, warehouses, etc., used in connection with stores or general offices under one management the single minimum as stated in schedule shall apply.

ELECTRIC

(1) The City will erect necessary wires, etc., to conduct electricity to the premises of the parties using current, free of charge, provided the service is not over 300 feet from a line that is available for the classes of service desired. If this distance is greater than 300 feet, the customer shall pay the actual cost incurred due to the greater distance. Provided that this shall only apply to where wires are for overhead consumption. Should other form of construction be required, it will be furnished and installed at the cost of the consumer.

(2) The Consumer must erect, at his expense, the necessary wires and apparatus to be used in dwellings, premises, enclosures to which the current is carried, bring out necessary "cut-in" leads and "meter-loop", where located by the City, and be responsible for their upkeep and repairs. All work and material must meet Standard Fire Underwriters Rules. Improper fusing is positively prohibited and any damage resulting to City's property, from such causes, will be charged to consumer. The City reserves the right to refuse to give service, or if already furnishing, to discontinue it for any violation of this section.

(3) Each "Cut-in" shall be considered as a separate service. If there is more than one "Cut-in" at the same location, the consumption recorded by the meter will not be added to arrive at the rate.

SCHEDULE NO. 1.—Lighting and Small Power Rate up to 25 Kilo-Watts Connected Load.

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE
OF \$175,000 CITY HALL BONDS.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Councilmen of the City of Orangeburg, S. C., in Council assembled, and by authority of the same:

Section 1. That it is hereby found and determined:

(a). That on July 9, 1926, a petition was presented to the City Council for an election upon the question of issuing \$175,000 bonds of the City of Orangeburg for the purpose of erecting a City Hall for said City, and that said petition was signed by more than a majority of the freeholders of said City as shown by its tax books.

(b). That, pursuant to said petition, an election was duly called and held on August 17, 1926, after notice duly given by order of the City Council, and at said election more than a majority of the qualified electors voting thereat voted in favor of the issuance of the said bonds.

(c). That it is necessary immediately to issue all of said bonds for the purpose specified in said petition.

Section 2. That for the purpose of erecting a City Hall for said City, there be issued the negotiable coupon bonds of The City of Orangeburg in the aggregate amount of \$175,000, consisting of 175 bonds of the denomination of \$1,000 each, numbering 1 to 175 inclusive, dated April 15, 1927, and bearing interest at a rate not exceeding 5 1/2% per annum, to be hereafter determined by resolution, payable semi-annually on the fifteenth days of April and October of each year, both principal and interest to be payable at the Hanover National Bank in New York City in gold coin of the United States of the present standard of weight and fineness; said bonds to mature on April 15th, annually, in numerical order, lowest numbers first, as follows:
\$5,000 1930 to 1939, \$6,000 1940 to 1945, \$7,000 1946 to 1952, \$8,000 1953 to 1957, all inclusive, without option of prior payment.

Section 3. That said bonds shall be signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the Clerk and Treasurer, and sealed with the corporate seal of said City, and the interest coupons there-
to attached shall be executed with the facsimile signatures of said two officers, and the form of said bonds and coupons shall be substantially as follows:

The Grantor hereby conveys to the Grantee, its successors and assigns, an easement, right, privilege and right-of-way of the width of _____ feet, upon, over and across the lands of the Grantor situated in the City of Orangeburg, County of Orangeburg, State of South Carolina described as follows:

The said line beginning at the substation of the Broad River Power Co. near the powerhouse in the city, from thence in a direct line to a point on the ^{WESTERN E.H. JMR.} ~~eastern~~ side of Sandek Street, from thence to the spur tract of the A. C. L. R. R. Co., running to the powerplant from thence across the said spur tract to a point on the ^{EASTERN E.H. JMR.} ~~western~~ side of the old swimming pool and from thence across Riverside Drive to a point on the corner of the Play Grounds premises on Russell St. and thence across Russell St., to property of ^{Mrs. A.S. E.H. JMR.} N. S. Wolfe.

the exact location thereof to be selected by the Grantee after its final surveys have been made.

Together with the right to enter upon said lands and to erect, inspect, operate, replace, repair and perpetually maintain a line of poles with necessary wires, cross arms, guy wires, push braces and other usual fixtures and appurtenances used or adopted for the transmission of electric current for light, heat, power or any other purpose.

Together also with the right to trim, cut and remove at any and all times such trees and underbrush as in the judgment of Grantee may interfere with or endanger said lines or any of their appurtenances when erected.

PROVIDED, however, any damage to the property of the Grantor (other than that caused by trimming, cutting and removing of trees and underbrush as hereinabove provided) caused by the Grantee, its successors and assigns, in maintaining or repairing said transmission line, shall be borne by the Grantee, its successors and assigns.

RESERVING, however, to the Grantor the right to cultivate the ground between said poles and beneath said wires, provided that such use shall not interfere with or obstruct the rights herein granted.

The Grantee agrees to pay and the Grantor agrees to accept in full satisfaction for the rights herein granted, the sum of _____ Dollars (\$_____), which shall be paid or tendered before

the construction of said lines is commenced, and in any event within _____ from date of this agreement; provided, however that if the Grantee does not commence construction of said lines or pay or tender the said sum within the time specified, the rights and privileges herein granted shall, without further act on the part of the Grantor or Grantee, be and become null, void and of no effect, and thereupon Grantee shall be relieved from any further obligation to pay the consideration herein named.



Pendarvis because the location of the proposed filling station is so near to the Orangeburg Hospital as to prove injurious to it and endanger the health of its patients, and

WHEREAS, having decided to refuse the said permit on this account, it becomes unnecessary for the City Council to consider the petition of others objecting to the erection of the said filling station on other grounds, but the Council will pass on them whenever it becomes necessary in the consideration of this or some other matter.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Councilmen of the City of Orangeburg, in council assembled and by authority of the same, that the City Council of Orangeburg refuses to grant a permit to Emma J. Pendarvis, her heirs and assigns to con-


