Minutes of regular meeting and of executive session held January 20th, 1959 read and approved.

Councilman Wannamaker read a communication referring to his request for raise of Salary of City Administrator A.T.Brown to \$ 10,500.00 stating his reasons and made a motion that this raise be granted, Voting on Motion. Ayes, Councilman Wannarmaker and Blackmon.

Nays. Councilman, Mayor Fair, Councilman Limehouse and ^Shuler. (See CouncilmansWannamakers Statement attached to and made part of these minutes.)

Mayor Fair stated that due to the financial condition of the City of Orangeburg at the present time that he was of the opinion that the request of the ^Police ^Department for an increase in salary be denied and that no increase in salary be granted to any one at this time and Council unanimously agreed with his recommendation.

Council Wannamaker brought to the attention of the Council the purchasing of Department of Fublic Utility Revenue Bonds by the Mayor without the consent or approval ofmCity Council and City Attorney Hugo Sims advised Councilman Wannamakerv that since the purchase of the bonds had already taken place and had been approved at a previous meeting and in the minutes that nonobjections were raised at the time of the purchase and that since Council had no set policy for the purchasing of Bonds that the purchase was in order and advised Council that if it so desired a policy could be be made and no action was taken.

Dr.J.W.Dantzler Health Office reported the killing of three rabid fixes near the City limits and advised Council that he had received very little Gooperation from County Health epartment in trying to control Rabies and requested the assistance of City ouncil in this matter.Mayor Fair advised Dr.Dantlzer that he would take the matter up with Dr.Goodwin of the County Health epartment and see if some cooperative arrangements could not be worked out.

City Engineer reported to Council that he had been making a survey in the City of ^Orangeburg of users of sewer facilities in cooperation with the Department of ^Public Utilities and that between 100 and 120,addittional users of this service had been placed on the books for collection of the use of the sewer service.

Chief of ^Police C.H.Hall stated to ^Council that there had been rumors that he was dissatified with his job and salary and that he was going to resign and that there was no truth to these rumors.

City Administrator advised Council that he had not asked for a raise nor had he requested any one to try and get him a raise in salary and that he had no present intentions of resigning and if and when this occassion should arise that the City Council would be the first **ho** know of it and not any outsiders.

H.P.Moore and T.S.Summers appeared before Council representing the Orangeburg Sportsmans Club requesting that the City erect certain boat landings on the Edsito River near the Bathing Beach, this matter was referred to City Administrator and City Engineer for investigation as to the locations and costs.

Council designated Friday February 13th, 1959 as Boy Scout Citizenship day at which time all departments of the City of Orangeburg would be taken over by certain designated Boy Scouts.

A petition signed by residents of Dantzler N.E. area requesting that ab a house trailer be removed from its present location was referred to the City Planning Commission for its consideration and recommendations.

Request from Bowman Manufacturing Company for tax exemption for a period of five years in accordance with Ordinance of City of Orangeburg passed in 1955 wasapproved.Exemption to commence with year 1958 and continue through 1962 privided the Bowman Manufacting Co. would meet the requiremanets of the Ordinance each year.

AN ORDINANCE TO BAR CITY EMPLOYEES FROM UNION MEMBERSHIP, was read by title and passed first reading by Council.

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE LICENSES IN THE CITY OF ORANGEBURG FOR YEAR COMMENCING APRIL 1 1959 AND ENDING MARCH 31 1960, was read by title and passed first reading by founcil.

City Administrator advised Council that he had received four bids for the purchase of two new trucks and that International had presented low bid of \$3511.53 and recommended that they be given the bid, for the purchase of the two new trucks and Council approved the same.

City Council approved a recommendation of the City Administartor that the South Carolina Electtic and Gas Company be permitted to relocate their 44 K V power line from Russell To Glover in the garden area. The new location to be as shown on drawing CP 7192 on file with City Engineer.

A resolution authorizing the Mayor to sign an agreement with the Atlantic Coast ^Line Railroad to correct location of a power line near Mile post K 382 was passed by Council. (See resolution attached to and made part of these minutes.)

Manager of Department of Public Etilities was authorized to rent house

owned by the Department at best rent available, by Council.

As recorded on January 20th meeting of City Council, Councilmans Linehouse made motion seconded by Councilman Shuler to increase the Salary of Mr. Allan Johnstone, manager of Public Utilities from \$9450.00 to \$10,500.00 per year effective February first 1959 Councilman Limehouse, Mayor Fair and Councilman Shuler voted for and Councilman Blackmon and Councilman Wannamaker voted against Then on Councilman Wannamakers motion to increase City Administrator Alec Brown to the same extent, seconded by Councilman Blackmon, thereby keeping these two men on an equal basis was voted for by Councilman Blackmon and Councilman Wannamaker. Voting against Councilman Limehouse, Councilman Shuler and Mayor Fair. For a period of years Mr. Johnstone and Mr. Brown have been on an equal Salary provision. In reality a City Administrator of Mr. Browns ability and geniuine interest should carry the largest Salary in the entire City. The manager of the Public Utilities, Mr. Johnstone, has a xuperim head of Elictricity, gas, water, office manager and assistant office manager and bookeeping department receiving salaries from \$8100,00 downward. I want it clearly understood that I am not offering complaint of any City Employee.Mr. Johnstones ability and managerial duties does not stand out above that of Mr. Browned Therefore the least is that Mr. Browne should receive should be on an equal basis with Mr. Johnstone. I should bring out at this point that Mr. Brown does not have any jurisdiction over the Public Utilities.

Of my own knowledge, Mr. Brown has been satisfied with his salary and has not requested any increase by virtue of having received better offers otherwise. I am confident that Councilman Blackmon and myself are reasonably aware of the duties and work that Mr. Brown carries as well as department employees under him.

This inequality is definitely a slap in the face of Mr. Browns position and other City Department employees. This inequality has created unrest amoung City employees which is not to the best interest of the City. It is disturbing to say the least. I have asked Mr. Brown not to submit his resignation because to do so would throw this city in a turmoil by other resignations.

Due to Mr. Browns loyalty to the people of Orangeburg and his friends he told me this afternoon that he would stay in his position but in fairness I again make the motion that Mr. Alec Brown, as City Administrator, receive the same Salary as Mr. Allan Johnstone, Manager of Public Utilities, namely \$10,500.00 per year effective February 1, 1959.

 - Area between Broughton and Middleton from present "B-1" line Northward to include W. A. Livingston property.

- Lot fronting <u>67.5</u> feet on Henley, a depth of 255 feet, East of and adjacent to Southern Bell property.

Mr. Horne made a statement for the Commission to the group reviewing the progress of aviation in Orangeburg and stressing the need for improved airport facilities - especially a paved runway. He expressed the belief that through City-County cooperation improvements could be made that would be impracticable for the City to accomplish without the County's help. He also stated that the Commission had no definite plan to offer but felt that a round-table discussion was in order and that some plan might thereby be devolved.

Senator Williams stated that the County had in the past made contributions to the airport development. He expressed doubt that State aid could be secured at this time.

Mayor Fair stated that the need for paved runways is evident and empressed belief that the City would be able to finance a share of the costs, provided the County would help and also provided Federal Aid could be obtained.

During the discussion it was brought out that the City now has approximately \$ 75,000 invested in the airport; that Federal approval of a stage improvement project had been secured when the power line was relocated and runway graded in 1955. It was also brought out that the present sod runways are 3000 feet and 3200 feet in length -The main runway (NE-SN) being 3200 and not to acceptable grade. The estimated cost of grading and surfacing this runway was given at approximately \$ 100,000. - 2 - CITY OF CRANGEBURG - Minutes of Special Meeting of City Council - April 20, 1959

After the round-table discussion Senator Williams suggested that the City Council and the County Delegation meet separately to determine each group's reaction to a joint plan of development. This procedure was agreed upon and after these separate meetings the whole group re-assembled. It developed that both the City and County had arrived at the same solution which was stated by Senator Williams as follows:

- 1. The City and County agree to joint ownership and management of the Airport with recognition of the fact that the City now has \$ 75,000 invested and in the event the property is put to other than airport use the City to receive from the disposition of the property the first \$ 75,000 with all above this amount to be shared equally by the City and County.
- The City and County agree to spend up to \$ 25,000 each for runway grading and paving, provided Federal Aid be available for 50% of the total cost; State aid, if any, to reduce to City's and County's share of costs.
- 3. Operation of the airport to be shared jointly by City and County with a six member Commission (3 appointed by City and 3 by County) having supervision.

NOTE: Fifty foot Right of Way (50') from Sta. 0400 to 17436; fifteen foot (15') Right of Way on left of center line from Sta. 17436 to 19425 and a twenty five foot (25') Right of Way on the right of the center line between the above stations.

City Administrator advised Council that the Annexation Petition had been checked by the City Tax Collector and that the required number of property owners had signed in accordance with the law, On motion by Mayor Fair, Seconded by Councilman Blackmon, this petition was referred to Orangeburg County Election Commission, Motion being unanimously approved by Council.

Driveway application from Louisa McLees on 301 Highway was presented and Council was of the opinion that the application should be denied, in that it proposes the private use of property purchased by the City and State funds and held in fee simple title. Council felt that applicant should be allowed to purchase this property at the price paid by City and State should she so desire. City Administrator advised Council that the purchase price of this property was \$2,000.00. This proposal was unanimously adopted by Council.

City Administrator advised Council that the water line to City Airport had been completed and that was now available at the Airport.

City Administrator stated that Peasley Youth Canteen had been practically completed and that the cost would not exceed \$10,000.00 as approved by Council.

City Administrator reported to Council that the South Carolina State Highway Department had been requested to widen certain parts of Broughton and Boulevard and this was received as information.

The 1960 Budget allotments as approved by City Council on September 8th, 1959 was signed by Mayor Fair and Councilmen Shuler and Limehouse.

The Manager of the Department of Public Utilities advised Council that he had obtained a 30 day option on the Dantzler property at a cost of \$ 1600.00 and as soon as the attorney could check the titles this property would be purchased.

Goungil Meeting Purpose 15, 1959

In regard to my vote against the entire Budget at the last meeting of Gity Gouncil I want to make my reasons clear why I did so and I request this statement be placed in the Gity records-The following are my reasons:

This city budget was taken up in two parts, namely operating and capital expenditures and Salary increases. The allotments for operating and capital expenditures exceed income and then the salaries were additional. On September 8th 1959 when the last part of the budget was considered, as submitted by The Gity Administrator, this constituted the entire Budget and I voted against the ENTIRE BUDGET AS LISTED.For the records I opposed the entire budget because it is unbalanced as to operating and capital expenditures and that in my opinion some salary increases are not in proportion.I also objected to the use of a fund from ACCUMULATED IMPROVEMENT FUND, in order to provide sufficient money to pay for budget expenditures.This ACCUMULATED IMPROVEMENT FUND is money that was specifically stated to be used otherwise as recorded in minute book number 6, page 2803 as copy was submitted to each member of Gity Council by Mr. Theiling, therefore I think it should be applied as stipulated by Gity Gouncil and not used as budget expenditures balance.

MINUTES OF SPECIAL MEETING OF CITY COUNCIL OF ORANGEBURG ON SEPTEMBER 15, 1959, FOR THE PUR-POSE OF HEARING CHIEF C. HAROLD HALL IN CONNECTION WITH ROOSEVELT CUMMINGS' MATTER. Mayor Fair: This meeting is called in regard to the Roosevelt Cummings investigation; you are familiar with that?

Chief Hall: Yes sir.

Councilman Limehouse: Would like to ask a couple of questions. In the statement that Mr. Sims prepared, Harry Houck stated that he had talked to the Chief personally and requested him to "lock Roosevelt Cummings up at night, and that the Chief told him that he would investigate the matter, but nothing ever came of it." Do you remember him talking to you and requesting you to lock him up?

<u>Chief Hall</u>: I do not remember him requesting locking up Roosevelt Cummings at any time.

<u>Councilman Limehouse</u>: Mr. Mayor, he stated that he talked with "Mayor Fair and told him that no action had been taken against Roosevelt Cummings, although Roosevelt was a suspect for breaking in the Hughes' home and asked him if something could be done to have Roosevelt locked up at night." Mr. Mayor, did you take any action?

Mayor Fair: If he came to see me, I do not recollect it. He said that he did. I do not recollect and would not say that he did not come to see me. I do not recall.

<u>Mayor Fair</u>: Harold, did Roosevelt Cummings seem to have a good bit of property during the time he was trusty? Did he have material possessions, such as radios, clocks, watches, etc.; did he seem to be in possession of many articles and items?

<u>Chief Hall</u>: He had those items when he was locked up the first time, because I investigated the case myself and went to his home, and he had more clothes than a couple of boys like me.

Mayor Fair: What do you mean by the first time? Did he have in his possession many articles of clothing, radios, watches, etc.?

Chief Hall: Six months before; when he was first picked up. He had those things then.

Mayor Fair: I meant during the time that he was a trusty.

Chief Hall: The only things that I know that he got was a pair of shoes and two pairs of work pants.

Mayor Fair: At the time he was locked up, he seems to have been in possession of a good many items?

<u>Chief Hall</u>: This is correct. He had them before he came to the City Jail. He had them at his home in New Brooklyn. I do not know of anything he bought while he was in the City Jail.

Mayor Fair: All of these articles he had in his possession before he was picked up and charged by the County?

Chief Hall: Yes sir; now, it could be one or two items that he bought.

Mayor Fair: How many charges were against him when he was arrested by the County?

Chief Hall: He was arrested by me and the County. I think about twenty-one counts -- sixteen County and five City.

<u>Councilman Shuler</u>: Charges made first time he was picked up?

Chief Hall: Yes sir.

Councilman Wannamaker: Do you know what is the customary procedure of sheriffs in the counties -- even State agencies -what privileges do they give to trusties. Are all locked up or ever locked up?

Chief Hall: No sir. Very few locked up at night. Have letter from Sheriff Reed and Chief Strom. Would be glad to verify what happens. I have talked to a number of other agencies as to how they handle their trusties and they handle them the same way that we do here. I have letters here and would be glad for Mr. Sims to read them:

Mr. Sims read letter from George L. Reed, Sheriff of Orangeburg County, addressed "To Whom It May Concern," dated September 15, 1959, as follows:

> "It has been the policy of the Sheriff's Office for a number of years to use certain trusty prisoners as janitors, as well as for use in performing other duties around the jail.

"While serving in the above mentioned capacity trusty prisoners are not kept under lock and key but are put on their honor not to escape, and to behave themselves."

Chief Hall: He (Sheriff Reed) lets them go home on the weekend.

Mayor Fair: Are they kept in jail?

<u>Chief Hall</u>: Yes sir; they have a basement down in the County Jail where they can come and go -- I mean it is not locked. In fact, we locked up one of his trusties just a week ago. I have a copy of a letter from Mr. A. W. Knight, Director of Orangeburg County, to Mayor Fair, a copy of which was sent to me, and ask Mr. Sims to read it.

Mr. Sims read letter from A. W. Knight, Director to Mayor Fair, copy of which was sent to Chief Hall, dated September 14, 1959, as follows:

> "This is to advise that Roosevelt Cummings, a trusty, who was serving time on the Neeses Gang, was loaned to the Orangeburg Police Department to serve as janitor at the city jail."

Mayor Fair: At the time you got Roosevelt Cummings, you knew that he had been charged with twenty-one counts of housebreaking and larceny and with possession of burgulary tools? You had that knowledge?

Chief Hall: Yes sir.

Mayor Fair: You were familiar with that, and you did not lock him up at night?

Chief Hall: Yes sir. I might state at the South Carolina Law Enforcement, they have trusties up there who are serving time for murder and they are not kept under lock and key. They drive

state cars. They run the trucks for them, and are not kept under lock and key. They stay out one hundred yards from headquarters.

<u>Mayor Fair</u>: Did you state that you arrested Roosevelt Cummings?

<u>Chief Hall</u>: I participated in the investigation. I do not recall whether I arrested him or whether Collins did, but he was charged with five city counts.

<u>Mayor Fair</u>: Charged with five City counts and seventeen County counts of housebreaking, larceny and in possession of burgulary tools?

Chief Hall: Yes sir.

Mayor Fair: Do you know the sentence?

Chief Hall: Yes sir; ten years.

Mayor Fair: Plead guilty?

Chief Hall: Yes sir.

<u>Councilman Shuler</u>: Did you know Roosevelt Cummings before he was picked up and sentenced?

Chief Hall: No sir.

Councilman Timehouse: Did you know that he was using a City truck?

Chief Hall: No sir; to my knowledge he never used the truck except to pick up signs or put out signs, or something like that.

Councilman Limehouse: He put out signs?

Chief Hall: Yes sir. He put up stop signs until Mr. Langford took that department over. He did all the janitor work at office. He repaired different things that needed repairing. He kept cars washed which was sometime as many as twice a week -four cars -- two motors.

<u>Councilman Shuler</u>: You asked for a janitor from the Gang? You wanted him for his qualifications as janitor?

Chief Hall: Yes sir; I asked for a prisoner and they recommended Roosevelt Cummings to me. I have had them previously to that.

<u>Councilman Shuler</u>: You had another prisoner before that? <u>Chief Hall</u>: Yes sir; three prior to that. Idid not have a janitor. There was no money in budget to get janitor and we used him as janitor; and handy man around the office.

<u>Mayor Fair</u>: I understand that you made statement that Roosevelt was the owner of considerable clothes, radios, watches, vacuum cleaners, and other various items of some value prior to your getting him from the County?

<u>Chief Hall</u>: I did not say he had all of the items then. I did not check into everything he had on him when brought to the City Jail.

Mayor Fair: Where did he keep them?

Chief Hall: In the Maintenance Shop where he stayed.

<u>Councilman Limehouse:</u> Is it possible that he bought some of these items after the Jervey break-in? He stole a good bit of money according to her statement.

Chief Hall: It is possible.

Mayor Fair: Why was the Jervey break-ins never investigat-

<u>Chief Hall</u>: As far as I know, they were investigated. According to the statement, got description as best she could give it, and proceeded to check around town to see if they could get anyone to fit description. Description was very vague -- could have found a good many negro boys of same size, dress, etc. It was not a detailed description.

<u>Mayor Fair</u>: According to testimony of officer in the investigation, your detectives, no man ever investigated the Jervey cases.

Hugo S. Sims: Matter was investigated by officers on duty that night. The three detectives on the force stated that they did not investigate. She talked about three different break-ins.

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Chief Hall: I think I showed you the complaint the Desk

Sergeant made that night.

The following is a copy of complaint showed to Mr. Sims: "COMPLAINT AND REPORT No. 2817 "Complainant Acadia Flower Shop 4-15 Time 12:40 A.M. Officer to "Address Russell St. Whom Referred 608-618-627 "Facts as reported by Complainant Went in bath room

and negro was standing in there.

"Action taken by Investigating Officer Man was gone when officers got there."

<u>Mayor Fair</u>: In a case like that, a matter of such importance, you let it drop without an investigation?

> <u>Chief Hall</u>: No sir. We never drop any case -- never. <u>Mayor Fair</u>: How about the Hughes! case?

<u>Chief Hall</u>: I interrogated Roosevelt Cummings when he was brought in on the Hurwitz job. He finally admitted to me that he broke in. He told me where he hid the money. I recovered the money.

Mayor Fair: I am asking about the Hughes' case.

Chief Hall: I interrogated him in regard to the Hughes, Jervey, Wannamaker, and other cases. He told me that he had broken in Mrs. Jervey's on two occasions. I took him by the Wannamaker place, and he showed me how he went into the place. Τ carried him by the Hughes place and asked him about that. He said he did not go in there. I asked him about another on the same Street, and he said he did not go in there. He said he did not break in the Hughes house. I brought him on to Hampton, and he pointed out the Kahnweiler house and said he went in there two times. I questioned him several times in regard to the Hughes case -- that this one case did not make any difference -- that he may as well admit everything. He stated to me and other officers that he had nothing to do with the Hughes' case. We picked up a white boy who admitted going in there and he was later sent to State Hospital for observation. When he came back he knew

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right from wrong, and denied going in there.

<u>Councilman Shuler</u>: Doesn't an attempted rape charge carry a more heavy sentence than housebreaking?

<u>Chief Hall</u>: Sometimes, yes. Mr. Sims can tell you that this was not a question of attempted rape.

Hugo S. Sims: From facts, it appears that he was in the bed and had a sharp object against Mrs. Hughes' throat. He was light and was thrown off the bed. It was a scuffle. Certainly different type case. Others involved stealing. This one involved coming in contact with white woman.

<u>Councilman Shuler</u>: Is it possible that he did not want to be connected with a case of that type?

Chief Hall: Mr. Sims knows as an attorney that you can touch a woman and you may be charged with rape whether you mean to harm her or not.

Mr. Sims: Charged, yes.

Mayor Fair: You said that when you got Roosevelt Cummings as a trusty, you knew that he had been charged on twenty-one counts of housebreaking and larceny and a charge of being in the possession of burgulary tools?

Chief Hall: Yes sir.

Mayor Fair: Then you issued a memorandum to the Police Department if any break-in or any affair around was reported, that the Desk Sergeant would immediately check on Roosevelt Cummings¹ quarters? Why was that issued?

Chief Hall: Because several of them said they suspected him but they did not know it. It was the only means of finding out.

Mayor Fair: You did not suspect Roosevelt Cummings?

Chief Hall: He never did show to me or any other officer any large amount of money that would suspect him of preaking in any place, except it was told to me that they suspected him, but as far

as suspecting him, I did not. I do not think he was ever questioned as to any break-in. Only once was he suspected, and he said he had been to the Edisto Grill to get a sandwich and this was confirmed by the officers on duty.

Mayor Fair: You did not suspect him?

Chief Hall: No sir, I did not.

<u>Mayor Fair</u>: In spite of the fact that several officers said "we suspect Roosevelt Cummings," you did not have any suspicions?

Chief Hall: No sir. We suspect a lot of people.

Mayor Fair: If you did not suspect Roosevelt Cummings, why did you issue the order to check him?

Chief Hall: I did that because some of the others said they suspected him.

<u>Mayor Fair:</u> And his quarters would be the first place to cover to see if he was in?

Chief Hall: That is true. Yes sir.

Mayor Fair: According to this report, he had been suspected several times, and you never did put him under lock and key since you had him?

<u>Chief Hall</u>: That is true. Until the Hurwitz break-in. That is the only time we had reason to lock him up.

<u>Councilman Wannamaker</u>: In other words, Roosevelt Cummings was never questioned on any of these break-ins?

<u>Chief Hall</u>: No sir, not until he was caught at Hurwitz Liquor Store. Then he was questioned on a lot of other cases.

Mayor Fair: In the Jervey case, was he questioned?

Chief Hall: He was asked where he was. He said he had gone to Bill Ayers' to get a sandwich, and Mr. Ayers verified this.

<u>Mayor Fair</u>: In other words, when you got him you had knowledge that he had been charged with twenty-one counts of housebreaking and larceny and being in the possession of burgulary -8--

tools, you took him into the Police Department, and never put him under lock and key?

Chief Hall: Yes sir.

Mayor Fair: Why?

Chief Hall: Because he was a trusty.

Mayor Fair: You did not ever suspect that he was involved in any of these break-ins?

Chief Hall: No sir. If I had, I wouldhave done something about it.

Mayor Fair: You mean that you can look me in the face and with tell me that/all the talk that your police officers were doing and talking about Roosevelt Cummings, that you did not even suspect him of being implicated in any of these cases.

Chief Hall: I did not.

Mayor Fair: I am surprized at you.

Councilman Wannamaker: Were there grounds for suspicion?

Chief Hall: No sir. Just idle talk.

<u>Mayor Fair</u>: Do you think he was out in the City truck the night reported?

<u>Chief Hall</u>: I would like to point out that they did not know that it was a City truck involved. No sir, I do not believe it.

Mayor Fair: Was the truck gone? Did you even check to see if it was there? In other words, some one told you that they suspected that he used the truck?

Chief Hall: That is right.

Mayor Fair: You state that a case is never dropped?

Chief Hall: No sir.

Mayor Fair: Has there ever been any further investigation in the Hughes' case, after you picked up this white boy?

Chief Hall: Yes sir. Roosevelt Cummings was questioned in regard to the Hughes' case on several occasions.

Mayor Fair: What do you mean by that?

<u>Chief Hall</u>: After he was picked up on the Hurwitz Liquor Store robbery, he was questioned on the Hughes' case, the Jervey cases, the Wannamaker case and the Kahnweiler cases, and he denied it every time -- was willing to take lie detector test, or anything else.

<u>Councilman Limehouse</u>: Most of these suggestions in the conclusions of Mr. Sims as to changing certain policy or making certain corrections, have they been corrected?

<u>Chief Hall</u>: Yes sir, on these different items -- even before I got a copy of Mr. Sims' report.

Mayor Fair: Roosevelt Cummings was supposed to have been in possession of quite a bit of goods. The Police Department apparently bought some of these goods, are you familiar with the Police Department buying all this equipment and articles of Roosevelt Cummings?

<u>Chief Hall</u>: I bought him two pairs of pants and a pair of shoes.

<u>Councilman Limehouse:</u> What you bought <u>from</u> him? Were most of these purchases made after Roosevelt Cummings was locked up? Do you know of other purchases before the arrest?

Chief Hall: None that I know of.

Mayor Fair: You knew that Roosevelt owned an automobile? Chief Hall: Did not know it until he was arrested.

Councilman Limehouse: Where was the car kept?

Chief Hall: Heard about it on the morning he was locked up -- found it in a parking lot.

<u>Councilman Limehouse:</u> Do you know how long it had been back there?

Chie Hall: Did not know he had one. Understand that he bought it from Woodrow Holman.

Mayor Fair: He bought it when a trusty?

Hugo S. Sims: Roosevelt Cummings purchased automobile from Woodrow Holman. Policemen learned of this from Patrolman Nichols of the S. C. Highway Patrol, who came by because some other negro had broken a traffic regulation while driving Roosevelt Cummings^t car. Car in name of Roosevelt Cummings. Police officers found out about it a number of months before the Hurwitz robbery.

<u>Councilman Limehouse</u>: How much did he pay for theautomobile?

Hugo S. Sims: Must have been around \$100.00. Roosevelt Cummings bought it from Woodrow Holman.

Chief Hall: Did he state that Roosevelt Cummings and an-

Hugo S. Sims: Yes; registered in Roosevelt Cummings' name. Officer who learned of it, Willie Leroy Kemmerlin, in his statement said he did not know that Roosevelt had an automobile, and that Mr. Nichols of the Highway Patrol picked up another colored man driving in an automobile, and the other colored fellow said the car was owned together, and that it was in Roosevelt Cummings' name.

Mayor Fair: On the Saturday before Roosevelt Cummings¹ escaped, somebody assisted him in selling his automobile. Are you familiar with that?

<u>Chief Hall</u>: I did not go in the cell block with him when this was carried on. I told them that I had nothing to do with selling the automobile. Mr. Ashe was the one who was there. Mr. H. B. Ashe was there. I had nothing to do with it.

Hugo S. Sims: Mr. Fickling stated that he learned that the car was for sale from Perry Way and that he and his son, James, visited the Jail, and talked with Roosevelt Cummings in regard to a price for the automobile; stated that H. B. Ashe was present.

Stated that he asked Chief to give him a receipt but Chief would have nothing to do with it -- said he could get receipt from Roosevelt Cummings.

Councilman Shuler: They let him keep the money?

Chief Hall: Yes sir.

<u>Councilman Wannamaker</u>: It would be up to H. B. Ashe to get the money from him, no doubt?

Chief Hall: Yes sir.

Mayor Fair: You knew that police officers were buying various articles from Roosevelt Cummings?

Chief Hall: Yes sir. I say some of it.

Mayor Fair: Even bought some of it your self?

Chief Hall: Yes sir; bought a spray gun, which he said he got with green stamps.

Mayor Fair: You did not suspect where all these things came from?

<u>Chief Hall</u>: I asked some of the boys. Mr. Ashe said that he got it with green stamps -- do not know how many books -- one book worth about \$4.00. Used sprayer around there spraying furniture. He worked on furniture.

Mayor Fair: Roosevelt Cummings accumulated practically all of his money on Friday and Saturday?

Chief Hall: So far as I know, yes.

he

Mayor Fair: Broke out of jail Saturday night?

Chief Hall: Saturday night or Sunday morning.

Mayor Fair: You have no idea how he got out of jail?

Chief Hall: He either had to let himself out, or some one let him out. He did not break out. Mr. Sims knows how the cell block is fixed. Could stick arm out and put key in lock.

Mayor Fair: Could/have come by the guard on duty?

Chief Hall: I would like for Mr. Sims to read statement of Sergeant Houck in regard to that:

(Mr. Sims read from his notes (furnished to the Members

of Council) of an interview with Sergeant Harry Houck, as follows:

"Mr. Houck states that he was on duty on the night that Roosevelt Cummings escaped. He went to make a check, probably about 4:30, to make a count and on looking in the window through his door, it appeared to him that Roosevelt was in the bed, because he saw what later turned out to be a rolled up mattress under a blanket. Roosevelt's shoes were on the floor under the bed, with the toes out. He did not notice anything unusual about the shoes. He does not remember seeing any leather torn away from the top of the shoes. States that he and Mr. Kemmerlin immediately checked the courtroom door and found it was mot locked. They did that right away because he did not think it was possible for Roosevelt to come out through the Police Office without his noticing him. He would not say it was completely impossible for him to have come through the Police Office, because he was out for perhaps one or two minutes once or twice during the night, had perhaps walked out front or out back or to the restroom. It is also possible that he may have snoozed for just a few minutes, but it couldn't have been for long because about each half hour, he has to call the cars and give them the time and make a log of that."

Councilman Wannamaker: Everybody who investigated found next morning that room to courtroom was unlocked?

Chief Hall: Yes sir.

Councilman Shuler: He couldhave slipped out and gone

through the courtroom?

Chief Hall: With other door open, chances are that he could have.

<u>Mayor Fair</u>: The door leading upstairs going to courtroom, isn't that kept locked?

<u>Chief Hall</u>: Do not have door. You go to cell block and walk right up to courtroom.

<u>Mavor Fair</u>: He got out of town and got to Columbia what time?

Chief Hall: According to teletype and information received, got in touch with SLED, checked railroad station and had picture; they said he caught the Silver Meteor at twelve something that night.

<u>Councilman Shuler</u>: What time was it that you got that in-

Chief Hall: May 31, 1959. Left on Silver Meteor at 1:55.

Council woman Blackmon: In the morning?

Chief Hall: Yes mam.

<u>Mayor Fair:</u> Do you have any idea how he acquired all this property that he had?

Chief Hall: I can give you my opinion. I can tell you how I think he got it. Are you talking about the clothes?

Mayor Fair; I mean all of his possessions -- hundreds of them.

<u>Chief Hall</u>: I do not know whether he had hundreds. I admitted that he had lots of clothes. Brought clothes to cell.

Mayor Fair: How many clothes did he have?

Chief Hall: Quite a few -- coats, pants, shirts and all.

Mayor Fair: Goodbit of clothes?

Chief Hall: Yes sir.

Mayor Fair: How many pairs of shoes?

Chief Hall: Do not know. May have been two or three

pairs. Did not see any of his shoes.

Mayor Fair: Do you think he brought all these articles when

came?

Chief Hall: Definitely think so.

Mayor Fair: Where is his home?

Chief Hall: Home is in New Brooklyn.

Mayor Fair: Is any effort being made to bring him back?

Chief Hall: Yes sir. I will ask Mr. Sims to read letter

from Mr. J. P. Strom:

Mr. Sims read letter to Chief Harold Hall from J. P. Strom, Chief, S. C. Law Enforcement Division, dated September 10, 1959, as follows:

"With reference to your recent inquiry concerning Roosevelt Cummings, this is to advise that the Law Enforcement Division is making every attempt to assist you in locating this fugitive.

"I feel sure that with efforts being made by you, the Law Enforcement Division, and with the cooperation of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, that Cummings chances to remain at large indefinitely are almost impossible.

"Assuring you that it is always a pleasure for this Division to cooperate with you and your efficient department in this and all matters of mutual interest."

Councilman Shuler: Do you think they will ever catch him?

Chief Hall: Yes.

<u>Councilman Shuler</u>: Do you think you will have any trouble extraditing him?

<u>Chief Hall</u>: No trouble extraditing. Would like for Mr. Sims to read another letter from Charles W. Brown of the FBI in Savannah.

> Mr. Sims read letter to Chief Harold Hall from Charles W. Brown, Special Agent in Charge, Bureau of Investigation, Savannah, Georgia, dated September 11, 1959, as follows:

"As you know, on June 1, 1959, a Federal Warrant was issued for the above captioned fugitive by United States Commissioner louis Rosen at Orangeburg, South Carolina, charging Cummings with an unlawful flight to avoid prosecution in that he fled the State of South Carolina to avoid prosecution for the crime of burgulary. This was done pursuant to your request for FBI assistance to locate this subject.

"This is to advise you that since June 1st the FBI has conducted extensive investigation in an effort to locate this individual in the New York, Massachusetts, Washington, D.C., Georgia and West Virginia areas.

"Investigation in this case is continuing and you will be immediately advised of Cummings' location and apprehension."

"Thank you for your cooperation in this matter."

Mayor Fair: Anybody else want to ask Chief any questions?

<u>Councilman Shuler</u>: It appears to me that there is a certain amount of negligence leading up to the escape or escapade and there is also a certain amount of "victim of circumstances" surrounding the whole case, both of which have bearing on the situation. Just want to say that those are the two factors as I see it from this report here.

Councilman Wannamaker: Negligence on whose part?

Councilman Shuler: On the part of the Police Department.

Councilman Wannamaker: Just wanted you to be specific -- not general.

Mayor Fair: Anybody else have any questions?

Mayor Fair: Harold, on the basis of this report, I am asking for your resignation, which action will be put before Council; and I am personally offering a \$100.00 reward for any information leading to the whereabouts of Roosevelt Cummings.

After Chief Hall was excused from the room, the Council discussed the matter in detail.

Mayor Fair moved that on the basis of the investigation in the Roosevelt Cummings escape and escapade, "I am asking for the removal of the Chief of Police."

Councilman Limehouse moved to table the motion of the Mayor, and Councilman Limehouse's motion was passed by a vote of four to one, with Mayor Fair being the only member of Council opposing the motion.

Councilman Shuler then made the following motion: "I move that the Chief of Police be officially reprimanded for whatever negligence was apparent in the Department, that his salary be reduced Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars a month for a period of the next six (6) months, that the Chief of Police be directed to set up a system of accountability in regard to cell keys and prisoners, and that the City Council does hereby set as an established policy that prisoners shall not be allowed to keep any money or valuables in the City Jail, and that the City Council set as established policy that the members of the Police Department shall not purchase items from or contract with prisoners in the City Jail.

The Shuler motion was carried by a vote of 4 to nothing, with the Mayor requesting that his vote be recorded as "not voting."
